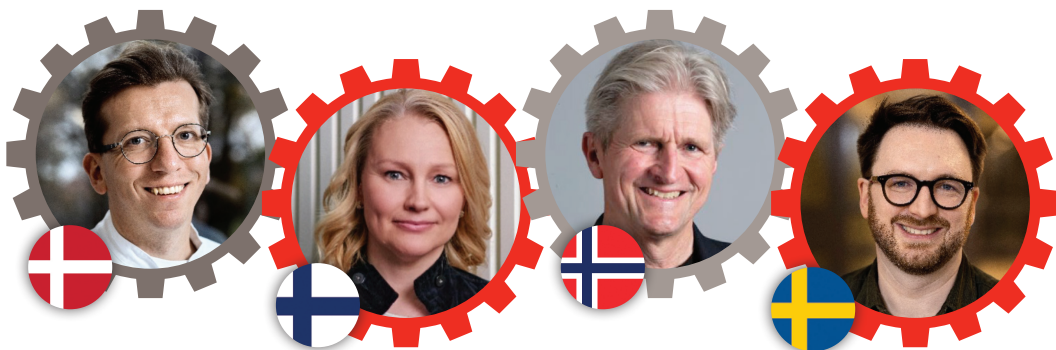

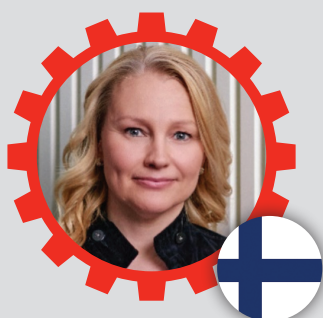

Associate Professor Kristian Steen Frederiksen, Denmark

Dr Kristian Steen Frederiksen MD, PhD, is a Neurologist and Associate Professor at the Danish Dementia Research Centre at Rigshospitalet in Copenhagen, where he is the director of the Clinical Trial Unit. His research centers on digital, fluid and imaging biomarkers for neurodegenerative disease, and pathophysiology and treatment of Alzheimer's disease and Lewy body dementia.



Associate Professor Johanna Krüger, Finland

Johanna Krüger, MD, PhD, is an Associate Professor and Neurologist specialising in memory disorders. She works as a clinical lecturer and director of the Early Onset Dementia research group at the University of Oulu. Her research has focused on the epidemiology, genetics, diagnostics and clinical features of early onset dementia with special interest in frontotemporal dementia and Alzheimer's disease.



Chair: Professor Geir Selbæk, Norway

Professor Geir Selbæk is a psychiatrist and dementia researcher, holding a PhD in geriatrics from the University of Oslo. He serves as the Head of Research at the National Center for Aging and Health and is a professor at the University of Oslo. His work focuses on cognitive impairment and dementia, contributing significantly to international studies on dementia risk factors.



Professor Michael Schöll, Sweden

Professor Michael Schöll is a Professor of Molecular Medicine at the University of Gothenburg and holds a PhD in Medical Science. He is also a Principal Research Fellow in the Dementia Research Centre at University College London, and Principal Investigator at the Sahlgrenska University Hospital. His research focuses on neuroimaging and biomarkers, as well as neuropsychological profiling to develop tools for early identification of neurodegenerative disorders such as Alzheimer's disease.
